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
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MAYBE I'M AMAZED

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

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

Science's greatest puzzle is where did we come from and how did we get here. This book shows how telling this story depends on understanding the gigantic family tree – the *Tree of Life* – that records the relationships between all species of life on earth – from humans, fish and butterflies to oak trees, mushrooms and bacteria. Studded with vivid and fascinating stories, this book is a biography of life itself. We'll learn how grey wolves are more closely related to humans than they are to Tasmanian wolves (or Thylacine) despite having near identical skeletons, because evolution baffles us by inventing the same structures in wildly diverging species. We'll see how geological change and environmental catastrophe left their marks on the genome, and follow individual scientists down winding evolutionary byways and dead ends in their attempt to solve this greatest of all puzzles.

Evolutionary biologist Professor Max Telford founded the Centre for Life's Origins and Evolution and runs the Telford Lab at UCL, where he and his colleagues use DNA to understand how closely or distantly species relate to one another. He has won several awards for his research (including a visiting Fellowship at All Souls College, Oxford) and is the Jodrell Chair of Zoology and Comparative Anatomy. This is his first book.

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
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OLDENLAND

Old age is a country, and we need to learn to walk through it. And that's just what Roger Clough, former Professor of Social Care, lifelong hill walker, and current resident of 'Oldenland' spends his time doing. Where he used to study the terrain of ageing like a scientist, now he understands it as a farmer might, walking its contours every day from his retirement village in the Peak District, while still walking the physical peaks and troughs of the area.

Whilst there are a lot of books that cover the 'how to have a good death', there is little that instructs us on the time period that comes before that. How do we learn to actually be old? How do we spend our later years in a meaningful way that makes sense of who we've been and who we are now? Not in blithely positive denial in the face of our physical and cognitive decline, or overtaken with regret of a life that's running down the clock, but empowered to not lose who we are; to say 'I am still me'. And, if we have not yet arrived at its borders, how can we better understand those who live there, and better prepare ourselves for a future when we will become citizens too. Written over 25 years and innumerable journeys, *Oldenland* is a unique and moving companion to the experiences of old age, and how to make it count.

Dr Roger Clough held the Chair of Social Care at Lancaster University, one of the top research and teaching Social Work departments in the UK. With qualifications from Cambridge, LSE and Bristol, he is an expert in residential & social care for older people, having published eight books. 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

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

Ian Kumekawa is an Anniversary Fellow at the Center for History and Economics. He obtained his PhD in History at Harvard University in 2020, his MPhil at the University of Cambridge in 2013 and his A.B. at Harvard College in 2012. 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

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
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THE WARRIOR Rafael Nadal and His Kingdom of Clay

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

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
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THE BOOK OF GUILT

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
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THE UNDISPUTED KING OF SELSTON

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
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PLEASE LIVE The Chechen Wars, My Mother and Me

'Please live' were the last words fifteen-year-old Lana said to her mother. Shortly afterwards Natalia Estemirova was kidnapped outside their apartment block in Grozny, Chechnya; on 15 July 2009 she was murdered for telling the truth.

This book, a defiant celebration of life, bravery and rebellion, is the fulfilment of a promise Lana made at her mother's grave. For centuries Chechnya had been a sharp bone in Russia's throat. And, three years after the collapse of the Soviet Union, frustrated by the continued presence of the independence movement within Chechnya, Russia invaded. It was a war of extraordinary brutality, which turned Lana's mother from a teacher to a human rights activist.

Despite their precarious living conditions, Natalia told Lana fairy tales, made her clothes and insisted she keep up with her French. As a member of the civil rights organisation Memorial, Natalia exposed the kidnappings, bombings, torture and murders that were happening across their country. And sometimes, as when she smuggled evidence out of the country inside Lana's pink kitty, she combined her roles as mother and activist.

This is a book about being both brave and ordinary in extraordinary times. It's about Lana listening to Radiohead on an MP3 player in a flat where the windows have been blown out, about how it feels to be sent away when it's too dangerous to be at home and the indignation of being told you're too old to wear jeans. Most of all, it's about the intense bond between a mother and daughter and the importance of belonging.
